THE NEW VCE IN 2023

Did you know that the Senior Certificate structure in Victoria is changing in 2023? The new format will see our current VCAL certificate become part of the VCE itself with a specialised certificate known as the Victorian Pathways Certificate.

The Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) is a new inclusive and flexible certificate. It will replace Foundation VCAL. It offers an engaging curriculum and additional support for you to develop the work-related skills and capabilities you need to succeed.



The VPC is flexible so it can be started earlier or finished over a longer period than 2 years. The coursework is designed and delivered at a more accessible level than the VCE and VCE Vocational Major. Students can study the VPC at their own pace and teachers will assess student progress through a range of classroom learning activities. The time students take to finish the VPC is flexible.

It has been a very busy Term 2 so far as we head quickly towards the school holidays.


We have been exploring aspects of the weather and the four seasons through the texts "Singing in the Rain" and "The Tiny Seed" as well as developing an understanding of step-by-step, or procedural texts.

Room 4 have followed a procedure to plant seeds in different ways, such as in a peat pellet, eggshells and pantyhose. We have all watched with interest as our seeds begin to sprout, even when they have not seen much sun recently!

This week, we have been finding out about "How to Wash a Wooly Mammoth" during reading, and it turns out this is not a simple task, but definitely quite funny!

We have been learning how to recognise, write and spell numbers during numeracy activities. Room 4 has some favourite counting songs including "Five Little Men in a Flying Saucer," "Five Elephants Went Out to Play" and "Let's Learn Our Numbers Zero to Ten."



























Room 4 have participated in weekly cooking activities, providing the children with the opportunity to develop hands-on lifeskills, numeracy skills such as measuring ingredients as well as how to follow a step-by-step procedure through the use of a recipe. We have made pancakes, muffins, cookies and the children are always excited to see what we will be cooking next, as well as the best part – getting to eat what they have helped to make!







We had a very successful week of swimming lessons in Week 4, which saw those participating grow in their water safety, skills and confidence throughout the week. It was also fantastic to be able to head outside of the school for an excursion into the broader community, which was such an invaluable experience, especially for those who have not had the opportunity before.

Nara, our Belvoir Wellbeing Dog, has continued to visit Room 4. She has enjoyed being read to by the children, taken for walks around the agora, or just catching up on dog naps, and continues to be a calming influence within the room whenever she visits us.

Last week, we read and discussed a story about National Sorry Day and its significance, and the children then had the opportunity to create a handprint to form a school-wide display for Sorry Day. ROOM 16 NEWS


























ROOM 24 NEWS



Wonder Recycling Rewards Program

Our school has registered again to take part in the 'Wonder Rewards Recycling Program'.

This means you can start saving your empty bread bags, including:

Bread roll bags, wrap bags, hot cross bun bags, etc.

Boxes will arrive in the coming weeks, so please keep your bags at home until further notice.

IMPORTANT: Please ensure all bags are clean, by emptying out the breadcrumbs and ensuring there is no residue or food left in them.

Bread tags also need to be removed and can be recycled (if cardboard).

Plastic bread tags can be saved and brought into the school to be passed onto the organisation 'Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs'. They have collection points all across the country, including two in Wodonga. For more information, click the link- https://ozbreadtagsforwheelchairs.org.au/


Don't forget to ask your family, friends and neighbours to collect bread bags and plastic bread tags for you as well!
